Since I will be out of town until next Thursday, I wanted to report to you what I have done to date in preparation for the State Dinner in honor of President Diem of Vietnam.

I have contacted Roy Underwood, Director of the School of Music, and Mr. Robert Emerson of Kellogg Center. The following agreements have been made:

- (1) A string trio will be available during the dinner. I have asked Mr. Emerson to have a piano in the Big Ten Room.
- (2) The State Singers (MSU A Capella Choir) have been engaged for the occasion.
- (3) I have arranged for the persons who are to sit at the head table to assemble in the Galaxy Room at approximately 7, 45 p.m.
- I would like the advice of the Committee on who should serve as Chairman of the dinner session. If President Hannah is not to appear on the program for remarks, or a short speech, he might be the logical one to serve as Chairman. In the event that he is otherwise tied up, I would recommend either yourself or Dean Taggart. It is my understanding that Governor Williams has been invited to give a talk at the dinner, and that President Diem will be asked to give a brief informal speech, or remarks, on this occasion. I would personally recommend that President Hannah be asked to talk on MSU's international program, in the event that he doesn't cover this subject in the afternoon. Even if he should discuss this subject at the convocation, I should think that since the audience will be quite different in the evening, it would still be appropriate for him to acquaint our guests at the dinner with the aims, objectives, and extent of our international program.

As soon as I return, I will contact your office concerning composition, etc., of the audience. At that time, we can decide such questions as who will sit at the head table, what type of menu we should have, and similar matters. I would strongly recommend that, for the evening affair, we invite the Vietnamese students, the

heads of State Government, including the Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court, and a selected number of industrial and business leaders. I would like to raise the question as to whether or not we should have a printed program for the dinner?

Your Eminence:

I am sure you will recall that you have been invited to visit
Michigan State University on several occasions when you have found
it impossible to do so, but have encouraged us to believe that
you would accept an invitation on some future occasion when
your schedule permitted. We have just scheduled an event in
which you may well have an interest, and I hope that this time
it will be possible for you to accept.

His Excellency, Ngo Dinh Diem, the President of the Republic of Viet-Nam, will visit our campus on May 15 and 16. This will be something of a homecoming for him, for he was a member of our faculty for a time while undergoing a self-imposed exile from his native land.

Michigan State University is planning to make the occasion a memorable one for him, both because we hold him in high honor for what he has accomplished for his people and for the free world, and because a mission from this University has participated actively in his successful establishment of a stable government.

The major event will be an academic convocation on the afternoon of May 15, at which time an honorary degree will be conferred upon President Diem, and when he is expected to make a major address. Michigan State University would be highly honored if you would consent to participate in this convocation by offering the invocation and pronouncing the benediction.

As you may well know, President Diem is a member of a prominent and devout Roman Catholic family, and his steadfast adherence to his religious faith is one of his greatest strengths as a leader of his people and an avowed enemy of Communism. His brother is Bishop Ngo Dinh Thuc, Apostolic Vicar of Vinh Long in Viet-Nam, and another of his brothers was killed by Communist terrorists in 1945.

I am sure that he would be gratified if you found it possible to take part in the convocation and the other events planned for his short stay on the campus. These latter will include a dinner given by our governing board, and a public reception following, both on the evening of May 15.

If you are free to accept this invitation, I would be happy to make reservations for you at our Kellogg Center, and for such others as might accompany you. If, unhappily, you cannot be with us, I would appreciate your designating an appropriate dignitary of the Church to represent you.

Because of the comparatively short time remaining for us to make our arrangements, we will greatly appreciate your letting us have your answer as soon as you find it convenient.

Let me repeat that Michigan State University would be highly honored to have you take part in this event, and that I would be most grateful personally for the opportunity to welcome you to our campus on this important occasion.

SUBJECT: President Ngo's Visit

Enclosed herewith is a preliminary English text of the address the President intends to give at MSU on 15 May. There may be further changes in it, of course, since, as you know, he usually alters his text at least once an hour up until the moment of delivery. The important thing is that he will deliver it in English.

We were all a little confused here by East Iansing's request that he deliver "a major speech" there, until everyone agreed that what was desired was that he not confine himself simply to politely saying "thank you for this nice piece of sheepskin." As it now stands, his address will be as long as any he gives in the United States, including that to Congress, and it seems to me that it has sufficient substance and "message" for the occasion. His public relations in the United States are handled by Harold Oram, 8 West 40th Street, New York City, and I think you might contact Harold if you want further information, later drafts, etc.

I think you will be favorably surprised (and by "you" I mean Ralph and others who have met him and heard him speak English) when you hear him give his speech. He astonished us late the night before last, just prior to his departure from Saigon, when he took the several English texts that had been prepared and proceeded to sight-read them aloud with what was to us a surprising degree of understanding, emphasis, and nuance. However, I would suggest that the microphones be carefully placed beforehand with the thought in mind that he does not always speak as loudly as, say, President Hannah or any other American who has done a good deal of public speaking. Furthermore, it might also be useful when setting up the lectern to remember that he is even two inches shorter than I, and might be handicapped by too high a reading stand.

His party will almost certainly include the following persons, and I assume you will receive a complete list from the State Department before his arrival: Secretary of State Nguyen huu Chau; Secretary of State for Public Works Le van Quang; Director General of Budget and Foreign Aid Vu van Thai (see enclosure!2); Director General of Plan Huynh van Diem; Press Secretary Ton that Thien; and Chief of the President's Personal Secretariat Vo van Hai. Also coming may be Ambassador Chuong, perhaps Ambassador Elbridge Durbrow (or someone else from the Department of State), and various valets, military aides (Ed Lansdale may be assigned to be the President's military aide while he is in the States), etc. All of the major persons listed, with the exception of Secretary Chau, speak English at least reasonably well, and even Chau understands a good deal and can speak, though with some difficulty.

I know that Hai and Thien in particular are eager to see those members of the White Suit Club presently in East Lansing, and I would assume you are arranging for some sort of an informal get-together in somebody's house the latter part of the evening on the 15th.

Have arrangements been made for any of our participants to be on campus on this particular day? One further thought: if the President is expected to make any remarks, however brief, after dinner or when descending from his plane at the airport, etc., etc., it might be well to advise Oram or Ambassador Chuong of this in advance, since this aspect of his schedule was not clearly spelled out before he left here.

SUBJECT: President's Visit

For your edification, Nguyen huu Chau is a connoisseur of oriental art. I know that Lansing and MSU do not have much to offer him along these lines, but if there is anyone in our Art Department who might engage him in intelligent discussion during a few minutes of the reception, he might well come away with the thought that the American Midwest does have at least a few cultured people. Mr. Chau is 36 years old, has a wife and, I believe, three children in Paris. I would suggest that his family is a good subject not to discuss, since he and his wife are separated, and his seven-year old son is very seriously ill. Furthermore, it is normally considered poor form among Vietnamese for strangers to ask probing questions about their families. He is a lawyer by profession, and his income as such supposedly was in excess of \$100,000 annually, until he accepted the post of Secretary of State at the Presidency. He is generally regarded as one of the most brillant persons in the Government.

Another subject which it seems to me one might well avoid in talking with the President is his family, and his sister-in-law, Madam Nhu, in particular. He is extremely sensitive to remarks in this connection, although it would not be untoward if one had followed the visit of his brother, Nguyen dinh Nhu, to the United States, to comment on that trip.

In looking over the list of persons who will accompany the President to East Lansing, I find that I neglected to mention the possibilities that his personal Chief of Staff, Lt. Colonel Huynh van Cao may also be along, in charge of his security.
