Through Mr. VC-VAN-HAI, Private Secretary of His Excellency The President. Iam glad to know that you are planning to spend some time hunting in Vist-Nan togards December 1958.

The hunting season in Wiet-Nam is opened for tourists 12 months a year, but November December January February and March are the five best months for visiting this country, as the climate would be as a whole the mildest. The Hunting Paradise is located around Barnsthuot Pleiku and Dalat which are all located in the Highlands. With an elevation varying from 1500 to 5.000 feet, you'll enroy a kind of warm spring climate during the December days and very cool, starry or moonlighted nights during the same period.

All you need will be to return the two blank application forms with two photographs to our office, and we shall be delighted to have overything ready at your arrival.

For your information, the hunting fees are 2.400 plastres (US\$35 about), but for every big animal killed, there will be an additional charge of (as the rate of 70 plastres for US \$ 1.00) :

US\$57.00 for an elephent (male only) US\$21.00 " wild ox

There is no charge for killing tigers, penthers, leopards, etc

Your little grand son of 11 years old is welcome to accompany you without an extra license.

As for a hunting guide, we shall recommend you one of our recognized professional guide if needed. The charge will be not over US\$50 - \$60.00 a day, meals, drinks, transportation, sleeping tents etc... all included. Our Hotels are scarce for the moment but you'll enjoy a stay in the Majestic Hotel in Saigon with an air conditioned room for as little as \$10.00 aday including one meal. A suite might cost up to US\$20.00 including one meal in the Saigon Majestic but you'll miss seeing Vietnam without a week-end in Dalat where the Californian climate is available 6 months a year without rains and another 6 months with more or less heavy rains. A suite in the Dalat Palace including hot running water and firewood heating will cost no more than US\$10.00.

I am looking forwards to meeting you and to assist you in anyways I can to render your stay more agreeable. I had the honour of accompanying President Hannah in one of his trip near Saigon and Dr. Fishel in many, many occasions.
